University Organizations

Any full-time student is eligible to join a registered University organization provided he meets the necessary requirements specified by each organization and as listed in the Policy Rules and Procedures for Student Organizations. Participation in some organizations is on a voluntary basis, others have academic requirements, and still others are based upon nomination and election by the student body. Students who wish to participate in any student activity should check the appropriate University Rules. Presently the Delaware County Campus has 13 registered organizations recognized by the University.

1. Undergraduate Student Association — USA's main objectives are to initiate legislation concerning student welfare, to provide the opportunity for the expression and development of leadership ability, to create and maintain the customs and traditions of the Delaware County Campus, and to recommend and coordinate all functions of the student body.

In order to continue its services, each fall the USA seeks new energetic leaders from the student body as council members to complete its membership. The executive members are elected each spring for the following academic year.
