

Tennis Team Improves Record

The Delaware County Campus Tennis Team picked up two victories in as many days last week beating Mont Alto Campus 5-4, and Allentown Campus 7-2.

In the Mont Alto match, Kevin Rice, Bill Quinn, and Jim Ortlieb picked up singles wins. The match was tied at 4-4 when second doubles team of Quinn/Rich Hartshorne won and third doubles team Nelson Schlater/Ortlieb lost a hard-fought three-set match. This set the stage for a dramatic three-set victory by the first doubles team of Rice/Tim McFillin.

In the Allentown match, Delco won all six singles matches while capturing a first-team doubles victory.

The two wins improved Delco's record to 2-3. The team plays at Schuylkill Campus today at 3:00 p.m.

Faculty Spotlight

Dr. Christopher Johnstone

There is a wealth of knowledge, experience, and friendliness contained in a conversation with Dr. Christopher Johnstone, Assistant Professor of Speech Communication.

Born and raised in California, Dr. Johnstone graduated from the University of California - Davis Campus. He earned both a Master's Degree and a Ph.D. in Communications Arts at the University of Wisconsin.

When he first entered college, Johnstone was an engineering major. But, after taking a speech course during his sophomore year, he decided that this line of study was better suited to his interests and talents.

While in graduate school, he became a teaching assistant, which helped him not only financially but also professionally. He realized teaching was a career he wanted to pursue.

Johnstone has been teaching at the Delaware County Campus since 1975. He finds the freedom, privacy, and the opportunity to attend professional meetings to be an advantage of the smaller campus. He was involved for some time as chairman of the Campus Faculty Senate committee on student affairs, and participated in the student leadership conference here last fall, which he found to be "a fulfilling experience for everyone." However, he was disappointed in the lack of student participation in the Faculty/Student Discussion Groups held earlier this year. He feels that the commuter campus atmosphere here is

detrimental to programs such as this.

During Spring Term, Johnstone is teaching an experimental course with Stephen Cimbala. The course, Political

Science 297, deals with the study of Aristotle's *Ethics, Politics, and Rhetoric* and how his works are still relevant in our public and private lives.

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Television Review

United States. Starring Beau Bridges and Helen Shaver. Created by Larry Gelbart. Produced by Gary Markowitz. 10:30 p.m. Tuesdays on NBC.

As a sleeping aid, *United States* is twice as potent as Sominex and not at all addictive. This program is talky, pretentious, ponderous and overblown. It is one of the worst shows of the year.

United States is the brain child of Larry Gelbart, the creator of *M*A*S*H*. How Gelbart could put together a series of consistently high quality such as *M*A*S*H* and then follow that success with a mess like *United States* is hard to conceive. Nevertheless, he's managed to do just that.

United States concerns the troubles and hang-ups of Richard and Libby Chapin (Beau Bridges and Helen Shaver), a married couple in their early thirties. Richard is a white collar worker; Libby is a housewife. They live in the suburbs and have the obligatory two children. In almost every way, Richard and Libby approach the stereotype of what the "average" middle-American couple is like. They also approach dullness.

Each episode follows the same pattern: a problem is introduced in the first five minutes then Richard and Libby sit around discussing it for the next twenty-five. As you can guess, this makes for an extremely dull half-hour. One even looks forward to the commercial break.

The idea of characters in a TV program discussing issues usually swept under the rug is a good one, and it can work - look at *All in the Family*. But whereas the Bunkers made us think by making us laugh, the Chapins try to make us think by boring us into insensibility.

In addition to this, the dialogue in the series is far from cleverly written, a fatal flaw in a show that is nearly 100 percent talk. Here's an example from one of the show's "lighter" moments:

Richard: "Did you know broccoli is a cabbage?"

Libby: "Only you would know that. Besides, if you haven't seen them in bed together I wouldn't go spreading that around."

Brilliant, eh?

When people watch TV, they want to be entertained. Merely because a program is intended to inform does not mean that its value as entertainment should be eliminated. Unfortunately, this is the case with *United States*.

On the plus side, Bridges and Shaver are capable performers. Sadly however, their talents are wasted in a disaster such as *United States*.

So, if you're looking for something to watch at 10:30 on a Tuesday evening, take my advice: turn to a rerun on UHF. True, you may not have your consciousness uplifted, but you will definitely be better entertained.

39.5% of all reported accidents in Pennsylvania compared to females between the ages of 16 and 30 who were involved in approximately 13.8% of all Pennsylvania accidents. This appears to indicate that males between 16 and 30 years old are involved in almost three times as many accidents."

The data which Mr. Finley presents is deceiving and may be easily misconstrued.

Finley argued furthermore that "if this rating classifica-

tion according to sex were outlawed and the rates for males and females were to be the same, then it would be unfairly discriminatory against the female because she would have to help subsidize the male losses."

In several other states where insurance commissioners have attempted to eliminate the traditional automobile insurance classification systems, their decisions have been overturned.
