### At University Park . . .

Fifty-one residence hall spaces were sold on the first day the University began accepting dorm contract exchanges Sept. 18. A student selling a dorm contract must provide an eligible student of the same sex to purchase his contract. The purchaser is placed in temporary housing.

Buyers are charged the cost of temporary space (converted study lounges housing up to seven students) for the remaining weeks of the term. According to William Mulberger, manager of the room assignment office, the only problem on the first day of exchanges was that some students thought they would be placed in the room of the contract's seller.

For the first time in several years, home football tickets are available on a game-to-game basis. Recent expansion of Beaver Stadium has had a major impact on this year's ticket sales, according to the Athletic Department.

Tickets for non-students were sold out in early July. Game-by-game tickets are still available for three of the four remaining home games — Miami, Fla. (Nov. 1), North Carolina State (Nov. 8), and Pittsburgh (Nov. 28). The Homecoming game with Syracuse (Oct. 18) was sold out in advance. Student tickets remain for all three games, while date tickets remain for Miami and N.C. State only.

University dining halls are continuing to buy food from the company that supplied the spinach in which a mouse was discovered this summer, the Daily Collegian reported.
