After joining ROTC, if a student likes the program and has maintained a 2.5 cum. GPA, he/she can apply for a scholarship with a reasonable chance for selection, especially for science, engineering and nursing majors. Army ROTC has 2- and 3-year scholarships that pay for tuition, books (\$225), and fees (\$350) and provides \$100 per month tax free in subsistence pay during the school year.
