## Garcia's Band Returns To Spectrum

November 16, 1993, brought the Grateful Dead's guitarist Jerry Garcia back to town, this time with his own band, The Jerry Garcia Band. Playing the Spectrum, a large forum for Garcia's solo act, provided an opportunity for many to see Garcia play (his solo shows rarely attract the sellout crowds that the Grateful Dead

The Jerry Garcia Band, which formed during the seventies as a result of jam sessions on the Dead's nights off, plays an eclectic mix of original and cover songs which all provide a launching pad for long guitar jams by

The November 16 show included oldies covers such as Second That Emotion and Stop That Train. This is one of the treats that makes going to see JGB fun: weird Jerry covers of

Unlike the Dead, whose playlist is never the same two nights in a row, JGB plays almost exactly the same show every night of a tour. If, on the other hand, you want to see Jerry jam, a JGB show is the place for you.
