Delco Honors Its Finest

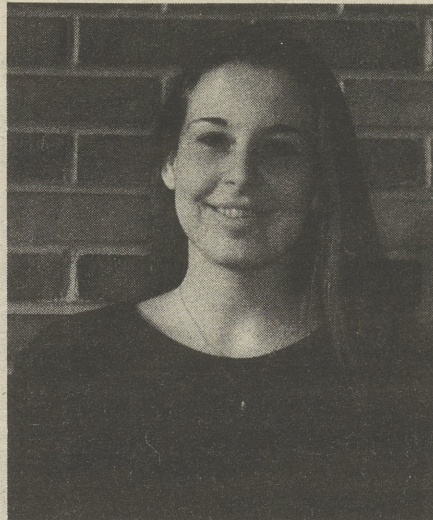
One hundred and twenty students were named to the Dean's List for the Fall 1996 semester, or about eight percent of the full time equivalent student population at the Delaware County Campus.

Students must earn a grade point average of 3.5 or above to achieve this honor. Fifteen students on the list earned a GPA of 4.00.

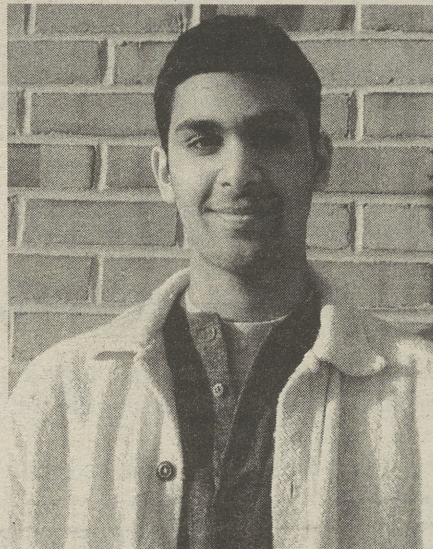
