Penn State's 'Hitmen' Look to Promising Future

After a sloppy first period by both teams, including a 5 on 3 Penn State advantage that registered zero shots and only 26 seconds in their offensive zone, the two teams left the period unharmed and the score tied at zero. Old habits die hard though and the Hitmen fell back on their hells and allowed a Hawks goal at 13:25.

After another failed power play, Penn State captain Phil Brady finally put the Hitmen on the board at 4:52, followed by Keith Baumeister's second goal in as many games at 1:56. The Hitmen went into the third period with the lead, knowing they had the advantage. "We knew we still had more energy going into the third," stated Mike Kida (2nd Semester, film and video).

After two goals by the hawks sandwiched between a Penn State goal from Bill Shepard, the Hitmen broke the game open with a short handed goal by John Copper at 2:07. The game still had some tense moments at the end caused by a Penn State penalty at :37 that resulted in a 6 on 4 advantage for the Hawks, but Penn State was not to be denied and they held on for the 4-3 victory.

Although the team's overall play has gotten better over the past months, their power play and defense continue to be their biggest problems. Over the past two games they are a horrendous 0 for 8 on the power play and have allowed 56 shots on goal. But, they do show promise and with their speed they make for an exciting game.

So, all is not lost in hockey land. Hey, at least the women's team came home with the gold.
