

Student remembered as eccentric, pal, hero

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"She was a teacher, and she now has to step away like a good parent does," said Jamie Baxter, another student. "We desperately need a mommy figure now."

"She taught me so many things, but most important, she taught me how to live and be myself," said Stone, a senior.

The second theme was Sarah the eccentric.

This was perhaps best voiced by a CD player, as the congregation listened to a slightly unorthodox version of Metallica's 'Enter Sandman.'

It was played not on overpowering electric guitars, but by a quartet of classical cellos. The moving experience was described as 'very Sarah.'

"We will probably laugh, and we will probably cry as well," had said Doreen Hettich-Atkins, director of student life, prior to opening up the floor. Subsequently, the largest portion of time was taken up not by the presenters, but by the audience.

Teachers, friends, sport compatriots, and even simple acquaintances of Sarah took center stage to express themselves in succession extending more than an hour and a half.

A number of people read poetry. Some borrowed lines that touched them or Sarah herself. Others, composed their own thoughts to share.

With the many emotions diffused from the individuals who harbored them, several acts of commemoration were taken by the Penn State Delco administration in Sarah's name.

The first act was a presentation by Karl Grieb, director of alumni relations. He awarded an Honorary Delaware County Constituent Society Membership, effectively making Sarah an alumnus of Penn State Delco, since this year would have made her a senior. The award was given to her family.

have been in the form of an engraved plaque. The general consensus was that only such a distinctly aesthetic monument would appropriately capture Sarah's character.

The final gesture was the creation of a Sarah Stover Memorial Scholarship. This fund will be available to English majors planning to complete their degree at Delco, as Sarah would have.

"We celebrate Sarah's life, we mourn her loss, and rage at how it happened," said Dr. Tomeszko.

Having done so, many of us can now sleep easier, and with peace. As tears streamed from her eyes, a friend dispelled our consternation: "Even though she's not here, she's always with me - just like she said."

Final Examinations

Classes meet for final examinations in regularly assigned classrooms at times based upon the regular class time.

Examinations for evening classes are conducted on what would have been the regular class day and at the usual class time.

Students with two or more examinations at the same time or three or more on any one calendar day or in three consecutive examination periods may consider this a conflict. The student should speak with the instructors involved at least two weeks in advance to make arrangements for resolving any conflict.

No examinations may be scheduled during the last week of classes. (Quizzes and narrowly limited tests in support of classroom instruction may be given during the final week.)
