Consorto's term over; two named as editors

Perhaps the two Penn State Delco students facing the biggest challenge when they return to campus for the Fall 2004 semester will be Sarah Gallatig and Jennifer Rufo.

It is they who have assumed the leadership of the *Lion's Eye*, which has been under the watchful eye of Editor-In-Chief Anteia Consorto for the last four years.

Consorto graduates in May, but not before she oversaw the transformation

of the *Lion's Eye* into a vital source of information on campus.

"No doubt Sarah and Jennifer will have big shoes to fill," said *Lion's Eye* adviser and English 110 instructor Bob Tennant. "Anteia was a driving force, a person dedicated to making the newspaper as good as it could be and determined to make sure that it lived up to its mission statement ... that is, that it be a 'vital part of the Penn State Delco experience.'"

"I feel like I'm leaving part of my family behind," Consorto said. "The *Lion's Eye* has been a very big part of my life for a long time."

At the same time, Tennant said the campus and the newspaper are fortunate to have the experience and ability of Gallatig, the current associate editor who will be the editor, and Rufo, the new managing editor, already here to oversee the transition of power.

"Both Sarah and Jennifer are terrific newspaper people and, more importantly, terrific people," he said. "They care about Penn State Delco and the personalities and the issues that make it what it is."

"I'm confident they'll seize upon what Anteia has done and take the paper to an ever higher level."

Consorto was quick to add her endorsement to her successors.

"They're two very capable people," she said. "Both have done so much already to make the *Lion's Eye* a very good newspaper. And they'll continue to do that."

Gallatig and Rufo already have been planning for the Fall 2004 *Lion's Eye*, and one of their goals is to have a newspaper on the racks when students hit campus late next August.

"The incoming freshmen need to have information ready for them at convocation," Gallatig said, "just to make them feel more comfortable. And when the returning students join them a few days later, they deserve to have us there to tell them what's new for the new semester."

Rufo has set her sights on fine-tuning the *Lion's Eye's* entertainment, sports and opinion sections.

"Almost out of necessity, the paper is very news-oriented," Rufo said. "When you only publish once a month, there's a lot of catching up to do with the news."

"But there's other things we need to do, like make sure the sports teams are fully covered, establish standing features, and appoint a columnist who can tackle some of the issues and people on campus with a combination of humor and insight."

Both Gallatig and Rufo wanted to make plain how indebted they were to Consorto, who will graduate with a degree in language arts and pursue a career in photography.

"There's no question that the paper wouldn't be what it is today without Anteia's drive and leadership," Gallatig said.
