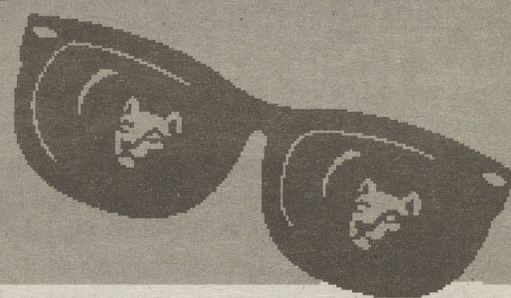

**ASTRO 001 (GN) Astronomical Universe (3)** The development of modern understanding of the astronomical universe from planets and stars to galaxies and cosmology. W-F 9:00 a.m.-12:25 p.m.

**B A 321 Contemporary Skills for Business Professionals (1-3)** Technological and interpersonal skills for the contemporary business professional, stressing collaborative learning, electronic inquiry and communications, critical thinking, and problem solving. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**BI SC 003 (GN) Environmental Science (3)** Kinds of environments; past and present uses and abuses of natural resources; disposal of human wastes; prospects for the future. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**CHNS 001 Elementary Chinese I (4)** Introductory study of Chinese language, with audio-lingual practice of Mandarin Chinese and attention to structure and the writing system. T/W/R 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

**ENGL 202C (GWS) Effective Writing: Technical Writing (3)** Writing for students in scientific and technical disciplines. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**ENGL 492 (ENGL 194) American Women Writers (3)** A study of selected American women writers. Web Course

**HD FS 129 (GS) Introduction to Human Development and Family Studies (3)** Introduction to psychosocial and family development at all stages of the individual and family life cycle. M/W 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**HD FS 431 (SOC 431) Family Disorganization: Stress Points in the Contemporary Family (3)** Focuses on divorce, remarriage, incest, family violence as well as problems associated with family formation and parent-child relations. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**PL SC 137 United States Intelligence and Policy Making (3)** The policy making process in the United States foreign intelligence and security policy; emphasis on the period following World War II. (3 WEEK INTENSIVE) M/T/W/R 2:00-5:30 p.m.

**ART 020 (GA) Introduction to Drawing (3)** Introductory experience in making of art through drawing media. M/W 1:00-4:30 p.m.

**COMM 100 (GS) The Mass Media and Society (3)** Mass communications in the United States: organization, role, content, and effects of newspapers, magazines, television, radio, books, and films. M/W 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**ENGL 420 Writing for the Web (3)** Analysis and composition of informative, persuasive, and "creative" Web texts, based on rhetorical principles; no prior Web writing experience required. Web Course

**HIST 021 (GH;US) American Civilization Since 1877 (3)** An historical survey of the American experience from the emergence of urban-industrial society in the late nineteenth century to the present. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**MKTG 301W Principles of Marketing (3)** Focuses on customer behavior, product, channels of distribution, promotion, and pricing with emphasis on a culturally diverse environment. Not available to students who have taken BA 303. M/W 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**MUSIC 007 (GA;US) Evolution of Jazz (3)** Study of the origins and development of jazz as an art form. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**PHIL 108 (GH) Introduction to Social and Political Philosophy (3)** Critical introduction to political authority, rights, justice, community, inequality, power, pluralism, and other contemporary, social, and political issues. T/W/R 1:00-3:20 p.m.

**SOC 005 (GS) Social Problems (3)** Current social problems such as economic, racial, and gender inequalities; social deviance and crime; population, environmental, energy, and health problems. T/TH 6:00-9:25 p.m.

**SPAN 001 Elementary Spanish I (4)** Audio-lingual approach to basic Spanish. M/W 1:00-4:15 p.m.
