Phillies Preview

The Phillies will report to Clearwater, Florida for spring training this year with one thing in mind: a parade down Broad Street in late October.

Pitchers and catchers will report a few days ahead of position players, on February 13th; among them will be the Phillies key offseason acquisition, Cliff Lee.

Cliff Lee, the most sought after player in free agency this year, decided to come back to the Phillies where he had major success in the second half of the 2009 season. Lee was traded from the Cleveland Indians to the Phillies, where he put up a 7-4 record with an ERA of 3.39. He also helped lead the Phillies to their second straight World Series, posting a 4-0 record with two complete games in the playoffs.

Philadelphia made a last second bid to acquire Lee, when the only two teams that were thought to have a shot at him were the Rangers and the Yankees. Lee was ecstatic to join the Phillies again.

"From the moment I got here, I knew it was something special... I never wanted to leave in the first place," Lee told sbnation.com.

Besides the \$120 million Lee will be getting from the Phillies, he also wanted to come back because of the fans.

"The intensity you can feel when you get in the game. Every game has an excitement to it. I don't know what the fans do to create that much more volume and excitement but there's something extra here. They don't need the teleprompter to tell them to get excited. The feeling of playing on the field feels different than anywhere else," said Lee.

Lee joins a pitching rotation that could already hold its own without him. The starting five helped as well. Doug Collins, a former 76er player, and has come back full circle of Lee, Halladay, Hamels, Oswalt, and Blanton give the Phillies the best starting pitching in all of baseball. It might even be the deepest starting rotation in the history of Major League Baseball.

The Phillies do have some question marks heading into spring training. With the loss of

last year, and the team had a horrible season. Doug Collins has changed the team's chemistry, figuring out where to put players in the lineup in order to win games. On February 8, the 76ers had one of their best games this season, beating the Atlanta Hawks 117 to 83, a 34 point blowout in Atlanta. The Phillies re-signed J.C Romero to a one-year contract, and Jose Contreras to a two-year contract this offseason to sure up their bullpen. They also have a designated set-up man in Ryan Madson, and a closer in Brad Lidge; both players have been shaky at times, but they are expected to do their jobs this season.

The problem lies in who else will fill the bullpen. Kyle Kendrick, Danny Baez, David Herndon, Scott Mathieson, and Mike Zagurski are just a few of the players that will be competing this spring to make the opening day roster.

The Phillies offense looks good as always. They have an opening for the fifth batter in the lineup after losing Jayson Werth, but Manager Charlie Manuel and the Phillies' personnel staff are looking to fill the void.

Players like Jimmy Rollins and Chase Utley will look to stay off the disabled list this year, and put up some big numbers; especially Rollins, who is in his last year of his contract with the Phillies. Rollins had the worst season of his career last year, playing in only 88 games and posting a weak .243 batting average.

Philadelphia fans all over are excited. John Celona, a Penn State Brandywine student, is very optimistic for the 2011 season.

"With the addition of Lee, I don't know who is going to be able to stop them this year. The Phillies have the strongest team in baseball, and I wouldn't be surprised if they win over 100 games this year. They are a lock to get to the World Series," John said.
