

In honor of National Eating Disorder Awareness Week here at Brandywine, the new counselor in Student Affairs, Ahyana King, held an event titled "America the Beautiful." At this event, various insightful pamphlets such as "Some Do's and Don'ts to Reaching Out to Someone Who May Have an Eating Disorder" proclaim appropriate actions to part take in when dealing with friends or family members that may have these illnesses. This was done to teach students about eating disorders so that others will know the signs when they see them. They may also suggest that the person seek professional help from a physician and/or therapist. Another useful handout Ahyana provided was a peculiar one called "Do I Respect My Body?" The pamphlet had an anonymous survey where students answered questions about how often they weigh themselves or how often they talk negatively about their own body. In addition to the meaningful discussion, Ahyana showed clips from the film America the Beautiful.

America the Beautiful is an American documentary film directed by Darryl Roberts about self-image in the United States. America the Beautiful reveals the horrid truth behind our country's unhealthy obsession with beauty. Before ever sitting down to watch the film, simply looking at the front cover reveals the wretched American values. It shows an image of the Statue of Liberty, a colossal American figure, having major plastic surgery implications. Upon seeing the film, you learn endless fats and statistics about how some young girls have greater fears of being "fat" than being diagnosed with cancer.

Ahyana provided some statistics she had researched herself, which indicated that 50% of people being diagnosed with eating disorders fit the criteria for depression. Ahyana gave this presentation honor of National Eating Awareness Week to inspire a balanced program for student at Brandywine and to "sincerely encourage people to be happy with who they are." Ahyana chose to show America the Beautiful because she says "it did a great job in talking about all the issues with body image, age and culture." In conclusion with her presentation Ahyana would love to see people striving to be healthier rather than "skinnier", which is a notion that corresponds with the 2012 National Eating Disorder Awareness Week's slogan to "count what truly matters!"

CSI Brandywine

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On Monday, March 19, Penn State Brandywine students and faculty will get the chance to hear from one of the few female Crime Scene Investigators in the country, Anya Sanko. Sanko, who has been working for the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department for nearly three years, will discuss the ins and outs of real life Crime Scene Investigations, and not necessarily the depictions that we see on television.

Originally from Detroit, MI, Sanko received her B.S. in Forensic Science from Michigan State University, and studied Biology at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. Not only does she have her qualifications in Science, she is also certified as a paramedic and a firefighter. Prior to becoming a member of the Las Vegas Police Department, she has worked as both a teacher and a paraprofessional at a few different colleges in the police, EMS, and firefighting departments.

Although she has never worked in a crime lab as a part of her police department in Las Vegas before, Sanko's knowledge of her field, will give the Brandywine community an opportunity to learn more about the forensic science career and in great detail, what it consists of. This lecture will also be the first at the college level, although she has spoken at several conferences in which focused on both firearms and foren-

Sanko's lecture is entitled, "The Girl with the Guns," and will be taking place in room 101 in the Main Building, during Common Hour. Following the lecture, Sanko will be taking questions from members of the audience.
