OUR SUPPLEMENTAL NUMBER.

Our readers will remember, that in the last issue of our paper, we promised at some future day to give them a supplementary number, which should contain a list of those who had

been active in getting us subscribers, and such facts and statistics regarding the fair as could only be obtained after it had been closed. We did not then anticipate it would be necessary to delay the performance of our promise for so long a time, but the machinery set in operation by the Fair had been so vast, that to give the results of its operations with anything like accuracy has, only very lately, been possible.

It suggested itself to our minds that it would be a good idea to give the names of all who had been active in their exertions and liberal

in their contributions to the Fair, and we had made some progress in that direction. We soon, however, found that in any space that we could command, it was quite out of the question.
