## Holstein Herds Win Recognition

Completing a year's test, two Lancaster County dairy herds have been cited by the Holstein-Friesian Assn. of America under the Herd Improvement Registry program.

A. W. Wickenheiser, Mount Joy, marked up a record of an average of 11,878 lbs of milk and 425 lbs of butterfat from a herd of 19 cows, while John C. Metzler, Christiana, with a 24-cow herd, had an average of 15,144 lbs of milk and 558 lbs of butterfat from twice-daily milking.

## Trucking Firm Offers Solanco Youths Awards

Junior class members studying vocational agriculture at Southern Lancaster County Joint Community High school in Quarryville will be eligible again this year for awards offered by Herr's Motor Express in an essay contest.

Title of the essay is to be "Full Utilization of Our Land Resources Through Truck and Bus Transportation." Deadline has been set for Nov. 22. Before essays are submitted for final judging, approval must be given by the English Department at Solanco and a representative of Herr's.

There will be three judges, and their decision will be final: Carl Reynolds, Jr., Quarryville borough burgess, Mrs. Richard Maue, secretary of the Southern Lancaster County Community Fair, and C. Wallace Abel, editor of the Quarryville Sun and business manager of Lancaster Farming.

First prize will be the choice of one feeding steer or one heifer, value not exceeding \$100; second, \$75 to be used on a farm project of winner's choice; third, \$50 to be used for a farm project of winner's choice. Prizes must be cared for according to recommendations of Jack Owen and Luther D. Peck, of the Solanco vocational department.

### Stuffed Pear Salad

Cut the meat of 1 ripe, flavorful cantaloupe into ball shapes; combine with green seedless grapes. Add juice of 2 limes and fill the cavities of unpeeled chilled Bartlett pear halves. Serve on crisp leaves of iceberg lettuce. If a dressing is desired, serve commercially soured cream.
