## **Tobacco Voting Polling Places** Dec. 29 Listed

Polling places for the Dec. 29 Lencaster County Tobacco Growers marketing quota referendum have been announced by the 16 Regricultural and Stabilization and Conservation districts.

Polls will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. next Thursday and votes will be cast to approve or disapprove quotas for Pennsylvania cigar filler tobacco for the 1956, 1957 and 1958 crops. Option of voting for quotas for the next year's crop only will be eliminated from the ballot.

Revised estimates brought the 1955 crop figures to 43,350,000 1bs on an alloted acreage of 28,900. Next year's figures are 37,800,000 lbs on an alloted acreage of 24,577, a reduction of about 15 per cent in acreage, 13 per cent in poundage.

A two-thirds majority vote is necessary

To be eligible to vote in the referendum, a farmer must have produced Pennsylvania filler tobacco (Type 41) during 1955. Notices of individual farm acreage

## Two-Thirds Vote Needed

Any farmer who shares in a cigar filler tobacco crop this year. either as an owner, operator, share-cropper or tenant is entitled to vote.

Other ballots will also be available for the single farmer in Lancaster County who raised burley tobacco during the current year. Quotas have been in effect on this type since 1939. The referendum on this type will be nationwide and will also be the next three marketing years.

## **Index of Farm Prices Lower During Month**

HARRISBURG ' Continued declines in prices received by Pennsylvania farmers for hogs and cattle sent the price index down two points or less than 1 per cent during the month ended November 15, the State Department of Agriculture said today. Farmers received slightly higher prices than a month earlier for wheat, oats, barley, hay and milk. However, a decline of three points in livestock prices more than offset these gains, a Federal-State survey revealed.

At 244 per cent of its 1910-14 average the index stands three points below a year ago.

Farmers on November 15 were averaiging only \$12.80 cwt liveweight for hogs, the lowest since March 1942, the survey showed. Lower prices for hogs and cattle were only partially offset by the seasonal advance in wholesale milk. Hogs were down \$1.70 cwt. from Oct. 15 and the \$12.80 average compares with \$20.20 on Nov. 15, 1954.

Beef cattle were down 80 cents cwt from a month earlier, calves down \$1.00 and lambs down 40 cents. Sheep and milk cow prices were unchanged from a year ago.

Chicken prices averaged 21.5 cents a pound liveweight, down 1.2 cents per pound from a month earlier, but nearly three cents above a year ago. Eggs brought farmers an average of 51 cents a dozen, down one cent from Oct. 15 but six cents higher than a year ago. At an average of 38 cents a pound, live turkeys were one cent above Oct. 15 and two cents-higher than on Nov. 15 last year.


