Growers of Vegetables Meet Jan. 18

Problems of the vegetable grower will be discussed in an all-day meeting Wednesday Jan. 18 at the Guernsey Breeders Sales Pavilion on Lincoln Highway (Route 30) five miles east of Lancaster at the Strasburg Pike crossroad.

Amos H. Funk, R1, Millersville, will preside at this parley of the Lancaster County Vegetable Growers, and Rev. Joseph Ball, R2 Lititz, will give the invocation. Sessions open at 9:30 a.m.

"Farm Safety" Film

"Farm Safety," a sound and color motion picture, will show precautions to use in handling equipment around the home and on the farm. At 10 a.m., Dr. Kirby, extension plant disease specialist from the Pennsylvania State University will discuss "Increasing net profits by controlling vegetable diseases as anthracnose on tomatoes and beans, grey leaf spot, early and late blight on tomatoes, root rot and mosaic on peas and beans, downy mildew on beans and pumpkins and leaf spots on carrots

Group singing will be led at 10:30 by Willis Nolt of the Farm Bureau.

Discussion on Insects

At 10:40, the theme will shift from plant diseases to insects, with J. O. Pepper, extension entomologist from Pennsylvania State University talking on plugging the holes by killing the bugs—wireworms, on most vegetables, flea beetles, sour fly, squash borer, aphids on peas, tomatoes, beans, pumpkins, mites on beans and tomatoes, leaf hoppers on carrots, string and lima beans.

Other features of the morning program include soil testing and farm labor James Eaking, extension agronomist, will tell of soil testing, soil structure, soil management for profitable crop production, and Henry A. Gruber, manager of a farm labor camp, will speak on "Farm Labor—Supply, Use, Housing"

Rev. Joseph Ball, R2 Lititz, will give the noon Prayer of Thanks, followed by a cafeteria-style baked ham dinner. Price of the noon meal is \$1.50 per plate.

Dutt, vegetable specialist from Pennsylvania State University, will discuss vegetable culture practices, fertilization, planting, cultivation, harvesting, handling, use of foliar sprays, side dressing with anhydrous ammonia or other forms of nitrogen and chemical weed control.

At 2:00 p. m. a solo will be given by Mr. Nolt, then the Rev. W. E. Trexler, pastor of the First Reformed Church, Lancaster, will speak on "Looking Ahead."
