Elverson Herd Tops Red Rose January Marks

Prilly Wayne Bessie Homestead, aged cow in the registered Holstein herd of Job Stoltzfus, R2 Elverson, topped the January records of the Red Rose Dairy Herd Improvement Association, producing 742.5 lbs of butterfat and 17,502 lb of milk during the month.

Levi S. Stoltzfus, R1 Ronks, placed second with an aged cow, Maybrook Rag Apple Sarah, who produced 17,698 lbs of milk 730 lbs of butterfat.

Topping the herds was that of Harry H. Ranck, R1 Ronks, with 24 registered Holsteins producing 1,877 lbs of milk and 73.8 lbs butterfat in the period. Second place went to Elam B. Beiler, R1 Gordonville, with 28 registered and grade Holsteins yielding 1,273 lbs of milk, 51.9 lbs butterfat.

Placing in individual monthly butterfat production were: 1, Dolly, a registered Holstein owned by Jacob R. Hoover, R; Gap, with 2,483 lbs milk and 126.6 lbs

Q A friend of mine owes the Federal Government for income tax. He received three warnings to pay but ignored them all. Last pay day he was told by the paymaster that a Government agent had confiscated his whole pay and will continue to do so until the entire bill is paid. He works at a Government installation. I say this is illegal and would like your interpretation of the law as applied to both government and private industry. R. S.

A. The Government has the right to reach almost all of your friend's property, including accrued wages in the hands of his employer. Only certain items, such as wearing apparel, are exempted.

The law is applicable both to employes engaged in private industry and to those working for the Government. But the Government must comply with statutory requirements of notice and demand and must continue to com-

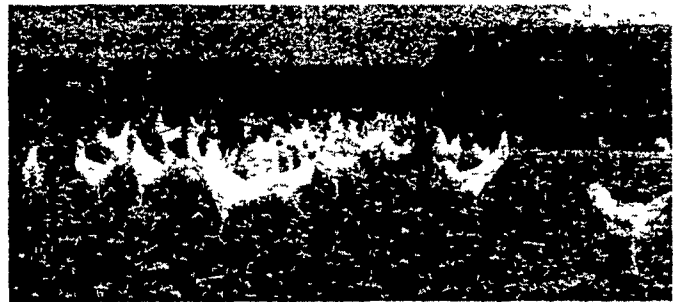
