

#### **Outlook for March 1956**



The Weather Bureau's 30-day outlook for March calls for temperatures to average below normal west of the Continental Divide and near normal in the northern Border States.\* In the remainder of the nation above normal temperatures are indicated, wth greatest departures in the Lower Mississippi Valley.



Precipitation is expected to be subnormal in the Southwest, Southern Plains, South Atlantic States, and New England. Greater than normal amounts are predicted for the Ohio and Mississippi Valleys and the Pacific Northwest, with near normal elsewhere.

# Eastern States **Purchases Hit** \$80 Millions Farmers in nine northeastern

states purchased more than \$80 million worth of supplies through their Eastern States Faimer's Exchange in 1955, more than 1000 members learned here as they attended the 38th annual meeting of their cooperative at the High School of Commerce in West Springfield Mass. The exact 1955 figure was \$80,428,260

Total net savings for 1955 were \$3,309,842 Of this sum, some \$2,309,842 will be returned to members starting May 1 in proportion to their purchases through the cooperative in 1955 This patronage refund represents what was left over from 1955 receipts after paying for all goods and services and providing for capital needs.

#### Significant Gains

General Manager William D Milsop reported significant gains in nearly all lines of commodities. His report indicated that feed volume was down slightly which tends to reflect the drop of farm income over the past year Eastern States deals strictly in cash and, for many farmers, cash has been a scarce item for several years In addition, many northeastern farmers are finding ways to produce more feed on their land in order to raise livestock with the greatest possible economy.

Some 100,000 farm families are now members of Eastern States Farmers' Exchange. They purchase a wide variety of farm commodities including feed, seed, fertilizer, sprays and dusts and farm supplies amounts to more farm supplies amount to more
