

Home spun linen was also an attraction, with tablecloths bringing \$15 to \$35 each, rolls of homespun linen, two feet wide and 14 to 21 yards long, brought \$4.50 to \$5.50 a yard. Five coverlets, made between 1830 and 1837, sold at \$30 to \$72
