

## Livestock Open Class Show in State Assured

HARRISBURG — Assurance that Pennsylvania soon may have the largest open class livestock show in the Eastern United States came today from Governor George M. Leader. He signed a bill April 12 which provides \$50,000 to the State Department of Agriculture for the purpose of developing and operating an annual livestock show each fall in the State Farm Show building. **First in Fall of 1957**

The Governor requested State Secretary of Agriculture William L. Henning to get the first Pennsylvania National Open Livestock Show underway for the fall of 1957. Liberal premiums will attract exhibits from some of the best breeders of beef cattle, swine and sheep in all parts of the United States and from Canada, he said. The "open" show differs from the State Farm Show which restricts entries to Pennsylvania breeders only. The livestock show will be held two or three months ahead of the January Farm Show each year.

Governor Leader said Pennsylvania livestock men have been urging an open class show for many years. The purpose is "to encourage and develop the livestock and allied industries as well as promote grassland farming as part of a conservation program for the preservation of soil resources."

### Use Farm Show Arena

The Department of Agriculture may make allocations of the fund, as it deems appropriate, to an incorporated association whose purposes are in accord with the intent of the act, the Governor explained.

"This is one more good use for the Farm Show Arena and livestock barns and will bring national recognition to Pennsylvania," he declared.

## New Holland Farm Bureau Branch Burns

Fire, Saturday afternoon destroyed two buildings at the New Holland Branch of the Lancaster County Farm Bureau Cooperative. A third building was gutted in the blaze which caused damage of \$150,000 or more. Insurance covered the loss.

Fire companies from six towns responded to the call, and more than 200 firemen were fighting the blaze. Companies responding in addition to New Holland, were Leola, Bareville, Blue Ball, Leacock, and Terre Hill.

The buildings, on South Railroad Avenue, near the business section of town, were discovered aflame at 2:45 p. m.

Destroyed were the 200 by 300-foot hay and grain storage building of frame construction, a 40 by 80 frame warehouse, and the main building, frame with composition shingles, was wrecked. Also lost were large amounts of supplies, hay, grain and hardware.

Two firemen were overcome while fighting the fire. Menno Stoltzfus, said suffering from smoke inhalation, and H. E. Stauffer, both of Bareville, were treated by physicians.

Cause of the fire remains undetermined, although it is believed transients may have been to blame. The buildings were also used by small boys.

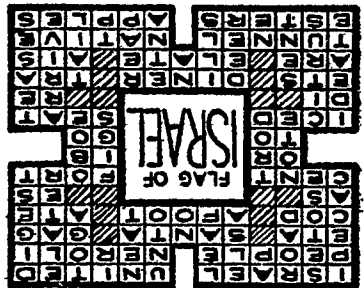
## WEEKLY CROSSWORD PUZZLE

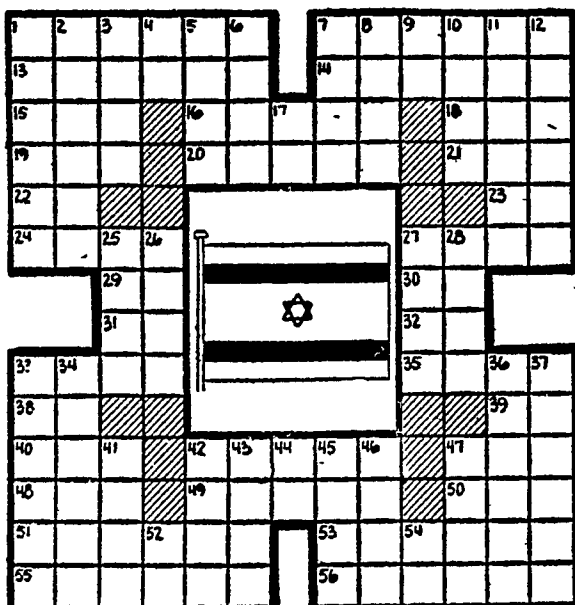
