## Turkey Egg **Tests Assure** State Standing

Turkey eggs totaling 2,800 selected at random from the farms of 11 growers were assembled Friday at the Pennsylvania State University where they were placed in incuba-tors Saturday for hatching by May 15th. The poults then will be raised under uniform grow-ing and feeding - conditions where they will be measured and weighed at regular intervals. Proving Ground

The project is regarded as a proving ground for the breeding ability of various turkey strains produced by the growers. This is the second year for the Pennsylvania project, one of only two conducted in the United States.

Each of the growers entered in this year's test has provided 200 turkey eggs as an entry,

Q. My husband has been declared permanently insane He has been in an institution for 20 years. I'm facing old age and could marry. I understand the laws of Pennsylvania make no provision for such cases. Why put a rope around a well person and have them drag along tied to one who will never be well?

K. F. A. It is true that insanity is not ground for divorce in Pennsylvania. If you had grounds for divorce against your husband before he was declared insane, it is possible that you might procure a divorce, providing certain procedures are followed and certain requirements met.

However, the procurement of divorce

under such circum stances is difficult at best. This policy was established by the Legislature in its enactment of the Divorce Law and only further action by the Legislature can effect a change.

Q. I have a baby and am not married The baby carries my name. Now I am to marry the father of my baby and I would like to know what I am supposed to do for the baby to have his name. The father's name appears on the doctor's birth certificate and the baby was born here in Lancaster. F. J.

A. Your baby will be entitled to his father's name upon your marriage. Proof of the marriage should be sent to the State Department of Health, at Harrisburg, requesting them to amend the baby's birth certificate. The baby's name will thus be changed to that of his father.

Q. How can I give a new idea to a company on improving their product and still protect my interest?

A It is suggested you arrange a conference with an official of the company, to be attended by yourself and your attorney. An agreement to protect your interest can then be made con-currently with the presentation terest can-then be made con-of your idea.
