Washington Job Safety Week

An occupational accident, in the factory, on the farm, or on the construction site, has three certain results—human suffering to the victim and his family, economic loss to his employer, and waste of precious skills to his country. There is another certainty about such accidents—they are preventable.

The typically American approach to the problems of job safety—the joining together of all interested parties on a voluntary basis—has saved untold millions of workers from disability and the agonies of injury. We must all make it a business of primary importance to devise methods for preventing the needless accidents that still happen.

In order to direct the attention of all our citizens to this vital work, I have designated May 13-19 as Job Safety Week. Outstanding businessmen, farm and labor leaders, State and Federal officials, and representatives from insurance, education and safety organizations will convene in Washington for the President's Conference on Occupational Safety. Their purpose will be to design voluntary programs to reduce preventable work injuries.

This is a work in which all of us must share. An injury anywhere is a loss to the Nation as a whole. Safety must become a daily habit in all our workplaces if we are to reach our full potential of strength.

I urge Governors and Mayors to use their good offices in their

own States and communities so that every employer and worker is aware of the need for safety.

I call upon all my fellow citizens to join with me in making Job Safety Week a success.

C. M. Wilson, Secretary of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association, has been invited by President Eisenhower to attend the President's Conference on Occupational Safety, to be held in Washington, D. C., May 14-16.

The purpose of the Conference is to save human life and limb and to further known accident prevention measures and safety education in the plants and on the farms of America. More than 3,000 management, farm, labor, and Government leaders will be on hand to hear the President address the Conference on the opening day.

Speakers and clinics will demonstrate successful methods of preventing work injuries in industry, agriculture, and public service. The three-day Conference will end with a report to President Eisenhower by Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell on the voluntary action required to prevent job accidents where ever people work.

President's Statement

In an effort to reduce human suffering, economic loss, and the waste of precious skills resulting from nearly 2,000,000 work injuries each year, President Eisenhower has, for the first time, called upon the entire Nation to observe "Job Safety Week" May 13-19.

Penn State Honors Ex-County Agent

Students preparing the annual Dairy Exposition at Peñ State on May 12 announced this year's entire show will be dedicated to Robert H. Rumler, former county agent, and now executive secretary of the Holstein Friesian Association of America. Rumler will be guest speaker at the banquet following the annual fitting and showing contests.

A graduate of Penn State, Rumler was an honor student in dairy science, and for many years served as county agent in Lycoming County. He is a native of near Chambersburg, Franklin County.

This year's show, with Darwin Braund, Sayre, as manager, has attracted the largest number of entries in the history of the exposition. Over 100 cows from the University's five purebred herds are being fitting for the contests. Numerous classes of competition are listed in dairy manufacturing where Bruce Knauss, Allentown, is manager with Richard Mong, Seneca, as assistant.

The show, an annual feature of the campus Mother's Day weekend program, attracts large crowds to the campus each spring.
