





Twenty members of this group Pomona Grange **Adopts Three** Resolutions

Three resolutions were adopted by Pomona Grange 71 meeting Saturday at Brickerville Fire Hall They are:

1, one seeking elimination of red tape in state sale of pheasants; 2, opposition to a State Liquor Control Board ruling permitting an hour's extension on bar closing times under daylight savings time, and 3, one concerning payment of state appropriations to school districts

One Form Per Pheasant

Individual forms must be preed, the Grange asserted, under current Pennsylvania Game Commission rulings The State Grange was requested to take necessary steps to have this re-

Resolutions Committee The petitioned Gov. George M Leader to set aside a Liquor Control Board ruling which permits bars and saloons to operate on Standard Time during the period when Daylight Savings Time is in effect. This would allow bars to remain open until 1 a. m. DST Sundays and 3 a m. DST weekdays, in contradiction to action by the State House of Representatīves which twice voteg⊷down bills to permit bars to remain open until 2 a. m Sundays.

Meet Again Aug. 18 At least partial payment of appropriations would be made to school districts as soon as available, under the third resolution offered. Such delays have caused many school districts to borrow funds to keep in operation, and when appropriations are received, they must be used to pay off the loans.
