Kennett Square Youth, Others See President

(Special to Lancaster Farming) James Clanton, R1 Kennett Square, was one of nine Pennsylvania Chicken-of-Tomorrow Contest winners scheduled to visit President Eisenhower in Washington Thursday morning. Mr. Clanton, with the other nine Pennsylvania winners, joined in presentation of a selection of contest chickens, in which his entry is included.

His was the sole Chester County winner, placing third among 233 entries, and eighth in the state finals at Altoona in a contest of 747 Mr Clanton is a junior at Umonville-Chadds Ford School, and he grew his chicken under supervision of W. Ross Wise, instructor in vocational agriculture. This was the sixth consecutive year for a winner to emerge in the C.O.T. contest from the Clanton household.

Heads FFA Chapter
During the 1955-1956 year, Jim was president of the Unionville FFA Chapter.

Chicks he entered in the COT contest were purchased from L. L. Logan, Kennett Square hatcheryman, and were purebred White Cornish or experimental Cornish Cross which Mr Logan has been breeding several years for their particularly fine meat qualities.

Jim was notified the night of May 14 that he had placed at Coatesville, and was requested to be in Altoona for the State Contest the next morning at ten. Mr Logan took Clanton and Clyde Jackson, Chester county supervisors of vocational agriculture, to Altoona in his plane on May 15, where Jim placed eighth in state finals. At ceremonies that afternoon, his award was presented.

His Birds Gross \$132
Mrs George A Leader, wife of Pennsylvania's governor, and Dr William L Henning, Pennsylvania secretary of agriculture, assisted V A Martin, assistant chief of agricultural education in Pennsylvania, in the presentation of awards at the Altoona contest. Some of Jim's chickens were selected as a special presentation to Governor Leader and Secretary Henning with Mrs Leader making the acceptance on behalf of the Governor.

Clanton's entry of 12 chickens, with eviscerated weight of 41.75 lbs, sold at auction last week in Coatesville, bringing \$4 per pound on the bid of Mr Logan. Mr. Clanton's gross was \$132.

Sattazahan Herd Scores New Record

Two registered Ayrshire cows in the Mrs. D. L. Sattazahn herd at Lebanon recently became member of the 100,000-lb club.

Sunny Ayr Dot accumulated a record of 106,473 lbs of milk in 11 years, while Avon Request Milkmaid made 101,695 lbs in nine years. The total of these two records would supply a family with four quarts of milk per day for 66 years.

Chester C. Putney, secretary of the National Ayrshire Breeders' Association at Brandon Vt. made the announcement. Mr Putney emphasizes that records like these demonstrate the persistent longevity of Ayrshire cattle which is a requisite of efficient and profitable dairying.
