Farming the poultry industry had decided to show the community "we're not thinking narrow terms alone."

First shovelfull of earth were turned Thursday by Dr. E. I. Robertson, president of the Lancaster County Poultry Association; Levi Brubaker, president of the Lancaster County Poultry Exchange, and Mr. Mortensen.

To date \$14,487.86 of the \$50,000 goal has been reached, and already power shovels have moved in to further turn the earth and create Lancaster Poultry Center. Through volunteer labor, as much as possible, the building will be constructed, with completion date tentatively set within six months. June 15 has been set as the deadline for pledges or donations to the Poultry Center fund.

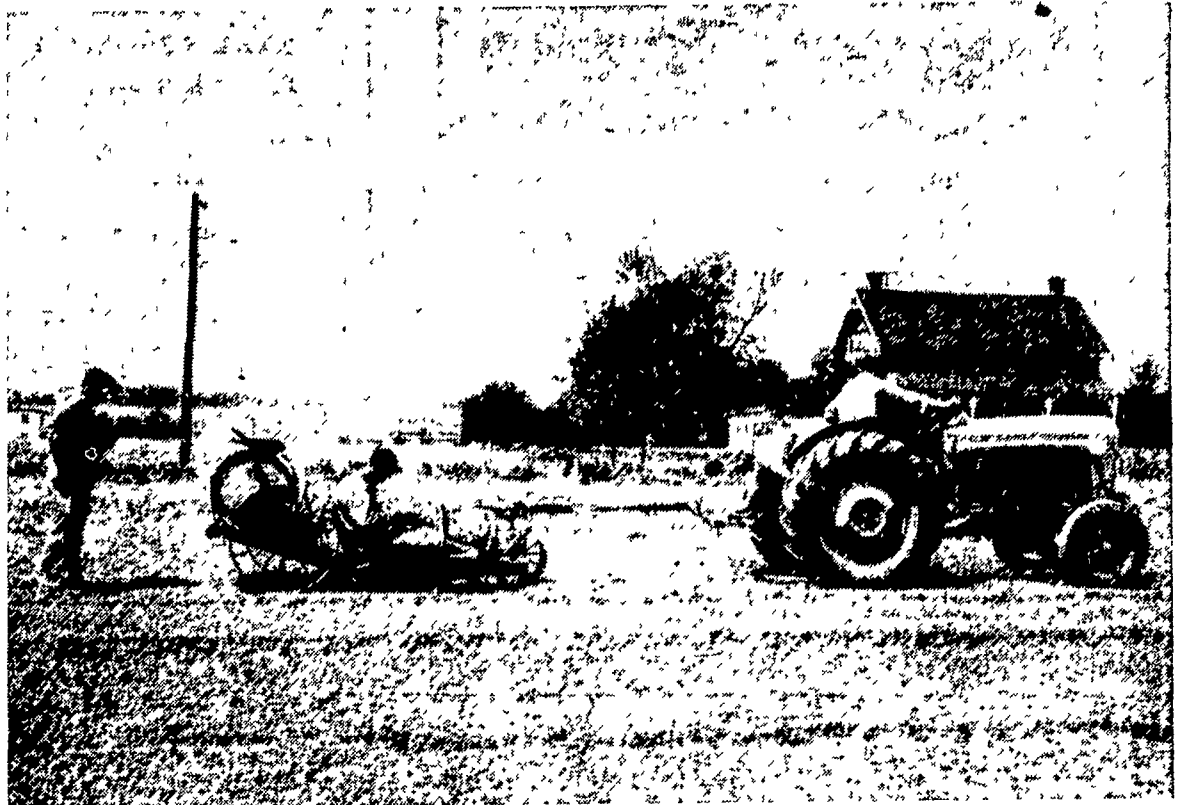

(Continued from page one) ed. although Mr. Benson said it is conceivable that certain spring-planted crops might be plowed under, but this would be determined later by farmers and the USDA.

In addition to the \$12 million soil bank plan, the measure also contains provisions for a mandatory increase in feed grain price supports, a discretionary two-price plan for rice, and an increase in corn planting allotments from 43 million to 51 million acres.
