Edward J. Woods will join the staff of the American Polled Hereford Association in June as field representative in the Eastern United States. D. W. Chittenden, Executive Secretary, has announced.

Woods will receive his bachelor's degree in Animal Husbandry from Pennsylvania State University in June, and will at that time assume his duties as field representative for the association.

His employment with the American Polled Hereford Association which covers the 13 Eastern and New England states and District of Columbia, bounded by and including Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Virginia.

Born and raised on a farm near Brookville, Pa., Woods has

He was active in the Block & Bridle Club at Penn State.

Woods' duties as field representative for the American Polled Hereford Association, Kansas City, Mo., national registration and promotion organization for the Polled Hereford breed, will consist mainly of assisting Polled Hereford breeders in any

way he can, and helping new breeders get established in the Polled Hereford business.

Bernard White, in charge of the Lancaster Weather Bureau office, advises Lancaster Farming the weekend outlook is for some showers and slightly cooler today. Hail June 10 marked a highlight in the weather picture, while rain to Wednesday measured about three-quarters of an inch, making a total of more than two inches for the month to that date.

Temperature during the first few days of the week ran three to four degrees above normal. A warming-up trend was noted in
