Lancaster Poultry Exchange (Rohrerstown, Pa) (Sales Report, Sale 154, Tuesday, June 12, 1956) — Fractional gains were recorded in Tuesday's sale of eight lots totaling 16,225 broilers on the Lancaster Poultry Exchange, with 11 lots totaling 26.425 listed and offered A total 10,200 birds were withdrawn from sale, with others selling from 1914 to 2014 cents, averag-

Topping the market at 2014 was the first lot, 350 White Vantress, nine weeks, six days, consigned by Donald Noll, R2 Lancaster, selling to Martin M Brendle, R1 Strasburg

For the corresponding day a year ago, Thursday June 14, 1955, Sale 62, fourteen lots, or 33,350 broilers, sold from 28 to 29%, averaging 28.82. Approximately 100,000 were listed for yesterday's auction.
