milk, stir.
Drop batter by spoonful into boiling ham and apples. Cover pan tightly, cook dumplings 10 to 12 minutes (Do not lift cover until ready to serve.)

(Sometimes Schnitz und Knepp is made without meat. Use recipe above omitting meat cooking apples until soft. Add brown sugar, three tablespoons butter or meat fryings, then add dumplings as above).

Our good friend Violet Preston, at 114 North 5 Avenue, Coatesville writes again, and this week sends us a recipe that dates back to 1872, from a cook book her grandfather gave her.
STRAWBERRY JAM

Take equal weights of strawberries and sugar. Put the berries in a dish and cover with sugar. Let stand overnight. In the morning, put the kettle on to boil two hours. Put in jars and seal.

Raspberries and blackberries may be cooked in the same way I use this, and it keeps, Mrs. Preston adds.

ASPARAGUS

Cut off white part and wash. Then place in sauce pan with water boiling water enough to cover. Add salt to water.

When young, it will boil in 20 minutes, then serve on toast. Season with butter.

It is very good, our reader tells. You can make a cream sauce for it. It's very good that way.

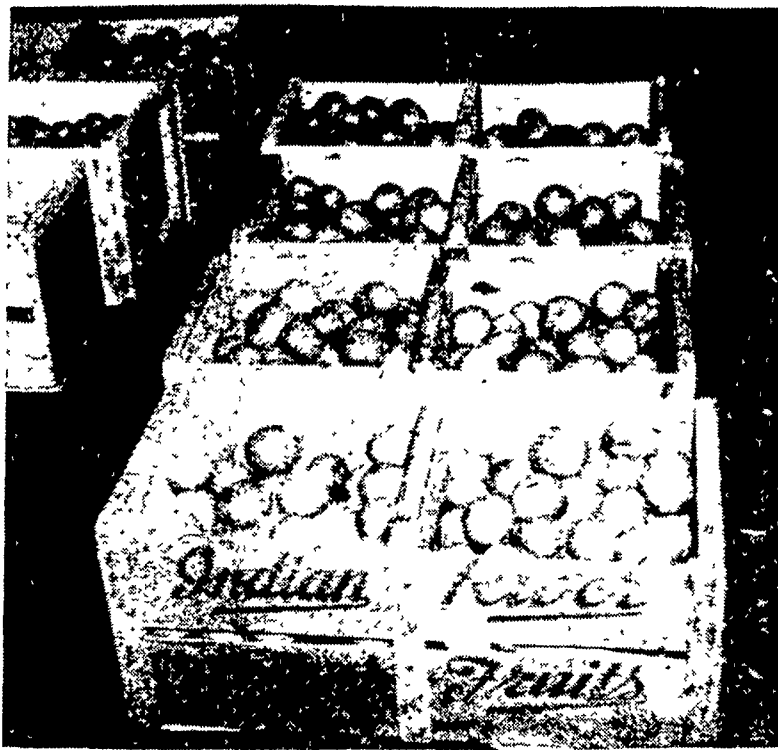
