Broiler Prices Decline One Cent July 12th; Receipts at New Record

Lancaster Poultry Exchange (Rohrerstown, Pa.) (Sales Report, Sale 162, Thursday, July 12, 1956) — Receipts totaling 176,865 birds sold in the week ending Thursday July 12 established a new record for the Lancaster Poultry Exchange, while Thursday prices moved a cent below the preceding sale to average 22 83 cents.

Listed during the past week were 227,115 birds. Listed Thursday were 61 lots, 154,515 birds, the same number were offered and 54 lots, or 120,165 birds were sold. Prices on 50 lots totaling 117,415 broilers, ranged from 22 to 23 3-4 cents. Two lots, 1800 Leghorn fowl, brought 17 to 17 1-4 cents, and two lots, 950 capettes, sold at 25.20 and 25.50 cents.

Last week's receipts moved 10,000 above the previous record set here during the week of June 5, with 81 lots, 227,115 birds listed, 75 lots, 176,865 sold.

For the corresponding sales a year ago, sales 69 and 70 on July 12 and July 14, 1955, listed were 50 lots, 132,260 birds, sold 44 lots or 115,860 birds in a price range of 27 to 29 cents, averaging 28.

Raymond H. Weaver, New Holland, scored the top Thursday on 800 Indian River broilers, 11 wks, at 23 75 cents.

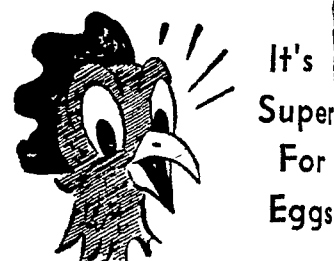

LANCASTER, July 18 — (USDA) (Wednesday to Wednesday Review)—Cattle this week 3532, week ago 3652. Fed steers steady to strong on good grades and better, spots 25-50 cents higher on weights over 1200 lbs. Standard grade steers and below 25-50 cents higher. Heifers, cows and bulls steady. Trading on early rounds Monday was retarded somewhat by heavy rainfall, but later action was fairly active and a good clearance was affected on all slaughter classes. Trading on stockers and feeders a slower than last week. Six head 1104-lb prime fed steers made \$24.00 and two part loads 1050-1210-lb prime reached \$23.50, other prime 1000-1255-lb fed steers sold from \$23.00-23.25. Bulk choice 910-1211 lb fed steers sold from \$21.00-22.75, most good grades steers brought \$19.75-20.75 and a few loads standard 875-1050-lb steers made \$19.00-19.75. Five head choice 878-lb heifers made \$21.25, a few good 775-850-lb heifers sold from \$19.50-19.75, most standard-good 623-874-lb heifers \$16.75-19.50, mostly \$18.00 up for good grades. Utility and commercial cows bulked at \$12.50-14.25, canner and cutter cows \$9.50-13.25. Utility and commercial bulls sold from \$16.00-18.00 and good fed bulls up to \$18.50-19.00. A few sales mostly good with a choice end 575-620-lb stock steers \$20.00; most medium-good stockers and feeders 431-910 lbs, \$16.50-18.00, one load 910-lb good feeders made \$19.00; bulk common-medium stock steers \$13.50-16.50, including a few loads 500-800-lb Holstein stocker and feeder steers from \$12.50-13.75. Scattered sales stock bulls at 15.00.

High-choice and prime vealers sold from \$23.00-26.00, a few head prime upward to \$27.00; bulk good-choice vealers sold from \$19.00-22.50; utility and commercial \$14.00-18.00 and culls down to \$10.00. One load around 225-lb slaughter calves made \$20.00.
