Efficiency in Livestock **Breeding Sought**

An all-out effort by farmers and stockmen for "marked improvement of breeding efficiency in farm and ranch livestock" was called for today by spokesmen lots, 168,285 birds, and sold were for the American Foundation for Anımal Health




