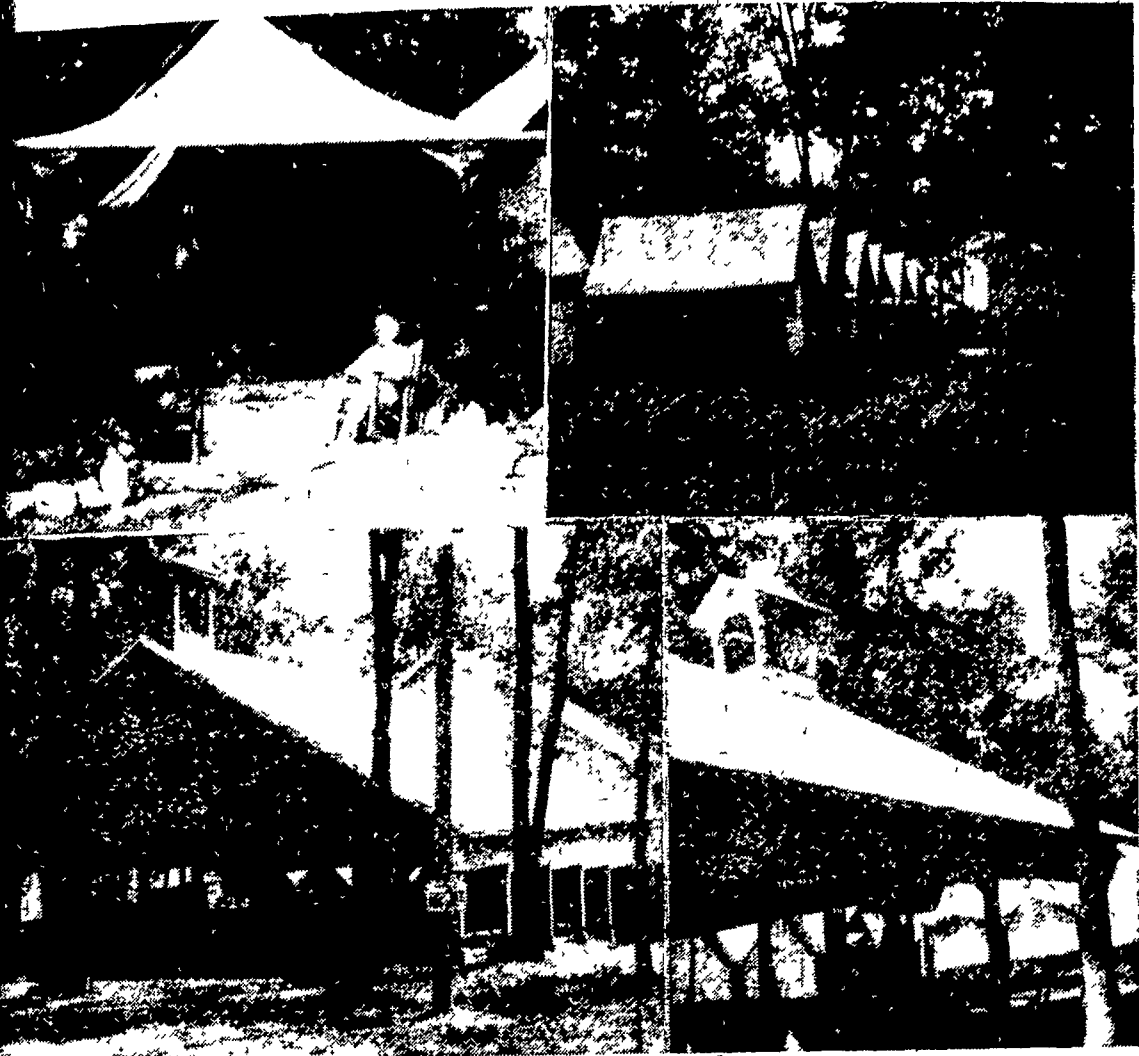


Camp Meeting Underway



The seventy-first annual session of the Rawlinsville Methodist Camp Meeting officially opened Tuesday with a meal at 5 p. m. in the dining room and a program by the evangelist, the Rev. Joseph Brookshire. The meeting will continue through August 6, ending with the annual March-to-Zion.

Officials state that 97 tents have been occupied, with approximately 350 people in residence.

Aungst Holstein Leads Red Rose DHIA in Month

The highest 305 day lactation was completed by a Registered Holstein owned by Harry Aungst, R1 Marietta. This Holstein produced 16,536 lbs of milk and 655.9 lb of butterfat. Second high lactation was completed by a Registered Holstein owned by J. Lester Stauffer, Manheim #3. This Holstein produced 17,487 lbs of milk and 618.1 lbs of butterfat.

The herd having the highest monthly butterfat average was that of Raymond F. Witmer, Willow Street #1. His Guernsey herd averaged 1040 lbs of milk and 51.2 lbs of butterfat. Second high was the Holstein herd of Harry H. Ranck, Ronks #1 with 1284 lbs of milk and 49.9 lbs of butterfat.

The high monthly butterfat producer was owned by Mary B. Stoltzfus, Morgantown. "Kate" a registered Holstein produced 2733 lbs of milk and 125.7 lbs of butterfat. Second high was a Registered Holstein owned by Henry E. Kettering, Manheim #1, "DunLoggin" produced 2550 lbs of milk and 122.4 lbs of butterfat.

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Lay Poultry Technicians Are Licensed

HARRISBURG — Licenses to work as lay poultry technicians were issued Wednesday by the State Department of Agriculture to 15 men and one woman who completed the first special training short course conducted last week at the Pennsylvania State University.

The training and licensing re-

sult from an enabling act passed by the 1955-56 session of the State Legislature and signed by Governor George M. Leader. The Governor encouraged the legislation as an aid to the advancement of the State's \$192 million poultry industry.

Two Million Tests

The newly licensed technicians now are eligible to go into business for themselves, drawing and labeling poultry blood samples for hatcherymen and poultrymen as a control measure in keeping flocks free of Pullorum disease of poultry

Previously this task was limited to practicing veterinarians. Blood samples are sent to the State Bureau of Animal Industry laboratory for testing. Currently, about two million tests are being run annually.

The lone woman to become a poultry technician is Mrs. Marion B. Kutz, 418 S. Walnut St., Lititz. She will receive license No. 6. The No. 1 license goes to Raymond W. Auckerman, R1 Irwin.

Licenses are good until December 31 of this year, renewable January 1, 1957.

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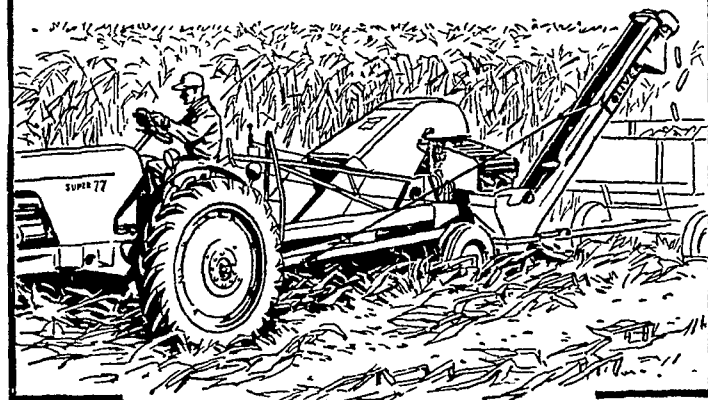
