Green Beans Bought For School Lunches

Washington — (USDA) — Purchase of 327,875 case of canned green beans for distribution to schools under the provisions of the National School Lunch Act during the period Aug 20 through Sept. 24, 1956, has been announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The beans, in No 10 size cans, ranged in price from \$3.1375 to \$3.80 per case for West coast purchase and from \$3.75 to \$4.375 in other areas.

Transportation costs were given consideration in making the acceptance. All of the above prices are exclusive of cash discounts.

These purchases are the result of offers received in response to the Department's announcement of July 13, 1956. Additional quantities were offered under the announcement but not at acceptable prices.

Farm Exports 1955-56 Increase 10 Per Cent

Washington (USDA) — United States agricultural exports in the 1955-56 fiscal year were estimated at \$3,475,000,000 in value by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This represents a 10 per cent increase over the 1954-55 total of \$3,145,000,000 and a continuance of an upward trend recorded every year since 1952-53. If cotton were excluded from the total, the 1955-56 increase would be 26 per cent.

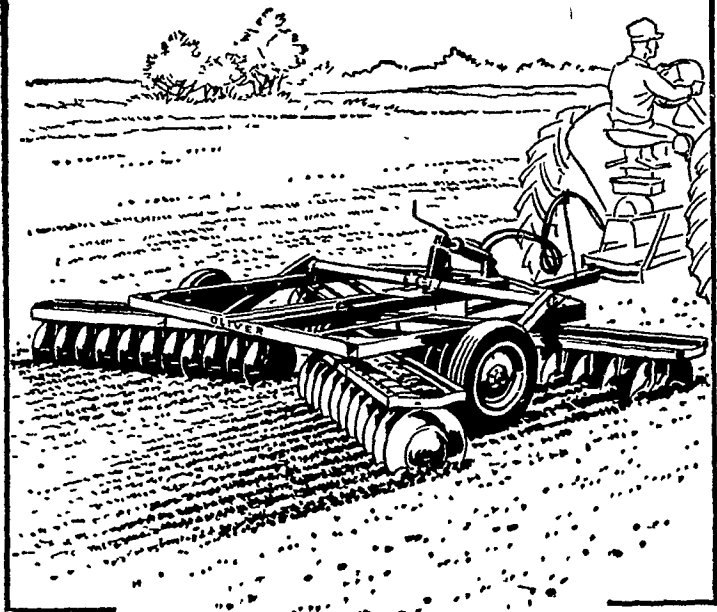

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
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
