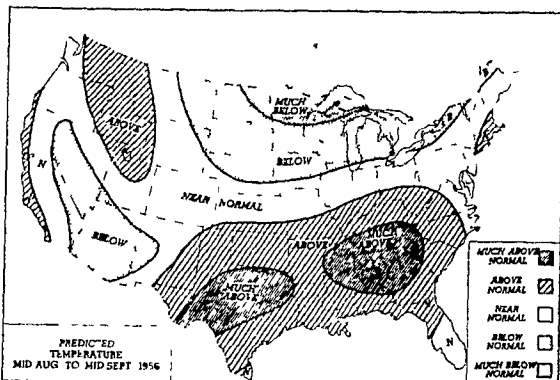

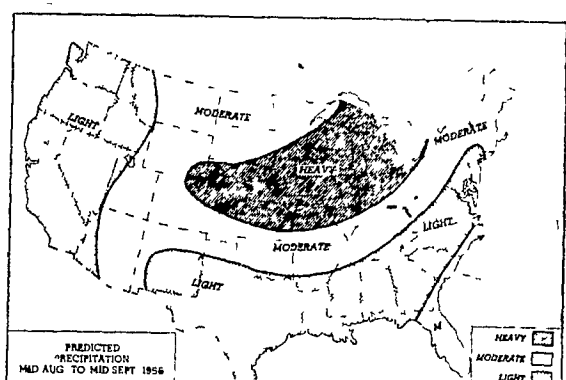

Outlook for Mid-August to Mid-September 1956



The Weather Bureau's 30-day outlook for the period from mid-August to mid-September calls for temperatures to average below seasonal normals in the Great Lakes region, Northern Plains, and for Southwest. Above normal temperatures are predicted in the southern half of the nation east of the Rockies, in the northern Plateau region, and along the



coasts of New England and California. In other areas, temperatures should average near normal. Precipitation is expected to exceed normal in the Central Plains and Great Lakes region. Subnormal amounts are indicated in the Middle Atlantic States, the South, and the Far West, with near normal elsewhere.

Lancaster, Aug 22 — (Wednesday to Wednesday Review) — (USDA) — **CATTLE** 4376, week ago 3724. Compared with last Wednesday slaughter steers high Choice and Prime fully steady to strong average choice and below weak to 50¢ lower. Heifers about steady. Some commercial beef cows strong to 50¢ higher, most cutter and utility steady with canner and low grade cutters around 25¢ lower. Bulls largely steady. Stockers and feeders strong to 50¢ higher. Receipts included about 50 per cent stocker and feeder steers and 15 per cent cows. Slaughter classes slightly larger than a week ago including numerous loads grass and grained on grass two-way steers. Bulk choice and prime fed steers \$25.50-28.50, a few loads 981-1279-lb prime steers \$29.00-29.50 a new seasonal high for loads. Good and low choice \$22.00-25.00, standard grade \$18.50-21.50 with grassers mostly \$18.50-19.50. Most cutter and utility cows \$9.75-12.00, a few commercial \$13.00-14.00, canners largely \$8.25-9.50. Utility and commercial bulls \$14.75-17.50, good 800-1000 lb fed bulls \$18.00-21.00, cutter grades \$13.00-14.50. Bulk medium and good 450-750 lb stock steer calves and yearlings \$17.50-20.50, a few good around 600 lbs to \$21.00. Common stock steers \$13.50-17.00. Most medium and good 800-1000 lb feeding steers 18.50-21.50, several loads mixed good

and choice \$22.00-22.75.
