warming trend started Thursday last week with a high of 82. Friday temperatures reach 85, Monday 81. In general the week was moderately warm, according to Bernard S White of the U.S. Weather Bureau office in Lan-

Tuesday found temperatures considerably cooler, with a high of 65, and by Wednesday morning the mercury reading in Lancaster was at a low of 45, at the waterworks 39.

The outlook is for temperatures to continue about 4 to 5 degrees below normal.

Despite the storms, it still continues a good season cropwise in Lancaster County, Mr. Smith adds. The weekend rains gave, a good boost to crops, and weather has been very favorable for new alfalfa, lawn and pasture seedings.

Growing conditions are good and farmers are reminded of the Oct. 10 fly-free date for wheat seeding, otherwise it may be a bit risky if seeded before. Barley should be seeded the last week of September to October 10, with Sept. 25 the earliest date.

Silo filling is in full swing, while the tomato and peach harvests have passed their peak. Potato digging will be starting for the next two weeks, and prospects look good.

Tomato picking will continue until frost, according to B. S. Warfel & Sons, one of the largest County tomato shipping stations on Highway 72 south of the Buck, where trailers carrying thousands of quarts of tomatoes leave nightly for market centers.
