Hillmac Sovereig Dies; Top Sire in

Breeders of Holstein cows in Southeastern Penna and Delaware experienced a disappointing loss when the Gold Medal Holstein siie, Hillmac Sovereign, died on Sept 11 according to an announcement made by David Yoder, Manager of the Southeastern Penna Artificial Breeding Cooperative A condition of arthritis that has become progressingly worse during the past two years finally proved fatal, Yoder said.

Hillmac Sovereign at six years of age was purchased by the Cooperative from David J. Roberts, Sauquoit, N.Y. for \$10,000 in July 1951. During his stay at S.P.A.B.C. he was mated to 66,070 cows, a figure unchallenged by any sire East of the Mississippi River. Resulting from this high number of services he has now more registered progeny than any other bull in the nation, a record once held by his late stablemate, Lauxmont Admiral Lucifer, who died in January of this year.

Yoder explained that services to Sovereign were not terminated by his death. The Cooperative has 3,033 vials of frozen semen in storage which will be available to SPABC. members
