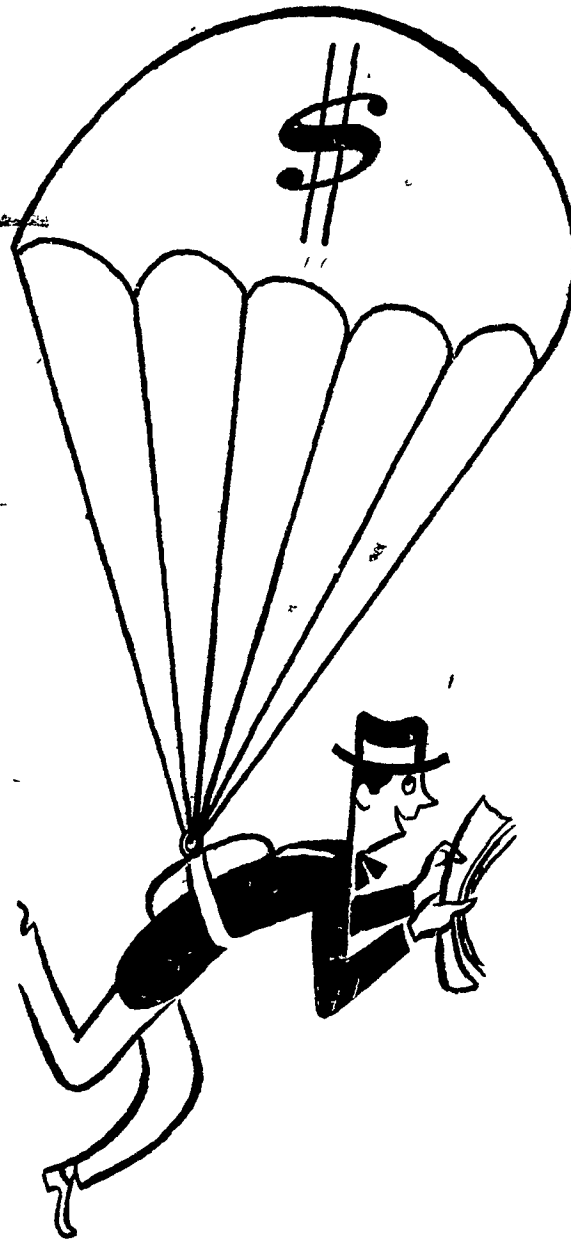

New dates have been set for the third annual Aberdeen-Angus Conference, which will be held March 10, 11 and 12, 1957, at Michigan State University, East Lansing. Formerly the conference had been announced for May, but it is believed the earlier dates will interfere less with seasonal farming activities.

The conference will be sponsored jointly by the Michigan and American Aberdeen-Angus Breeders' Association in cooperation with Michigan State University, according to Frank Richards, secretary of the national organization. Dr. R. H. Nelson, head of the department of animal husbandry, and Byron H. Good, superintendent of farm, will be in charge of local planning, working closely with the officers and members of the Michigan Aberdeen-Angus Breeders' Association.

Dairy Fluid Milk Use Averages Low

The average American uses only a trifle more than three-fourths of a pint of fluid milk a day, Daniel A. Swope, of the department of agricultural economics and rural sociology at the Pennsylvania State University, found in a review of national studies of milk consumption.

About three-fourths of the fluid milk bought by the average family is used for drinking. Children, naturally, drink more milk than do adults, and more men than women reported that they like milk.
