

## Eastern States Opens Regional Office at York

The first work day after Labor Day, 1956, saw at York, Pa., the opening of the first regional distribution office by the Eastern States Farmers' Exchange.

For 38 years that nine-state cooperative has supervised all production from its home office at West Springfield, Mass. The growing volume of its supply distribution to Middle Atlantic farmers made the new step advisable.

The regional office will serve the states of Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Delaware where Eastern States membership exceeds 51,000 farmers. Initially staffed by seven men, the office is a wing of the Eastern States Spring Garden plant opened less than a year ago at York.

The objectives of the new office include (1) provision of a staff of specialists who will live with and concentrate on the special conditions of agriculture in the Middle Atlantic states, (2) reinforcement of the field representatives in the three states, and (3) reduction of staff travel time between the home — and heretofore only — office at West Springfield, Mass.

## New Yorkers Win Tops at Eastern States Angus Show

Aberdeen-Angus steers won all the major awards in the junior club show and the open steer show at the Eastern States Exposition, Springfield, Mass., on judging day.

Grand champion over the 4-H Club show was an 850-pound Angus steer named Ankony Laddie 5th, shown by Fred Scoralick, Poughquag, N. Y. The summer yearling steer, later named grand champion of the open show, was sired by O. Bardoliermeire, 1953 International Grand Champion Angus bull.

The reserve grand champion of the club show, as well as the open show, was a heavyweight Angus steer shown by Roger Hetherington, Stanfordsville, N. Y. He was named Mole's Hill Laddie 2nd.

The Aberdeen-Angus received the Highly Commended Steer and the Commended Steer awards. They were Ankony Laddie 2nd, exhibited by Joy Leachman, Rhinebeck, N. Y., and Black Beauty, shown by Thomas Husted, Seymour, Conn., respectively.

There were 86 steers of all breeds competing in the Club Show which was judged by Byron Good, Michigan State University.

## Greider White Leghorns Win

United States. Top pen in the U. S. was a White Leghorn entry by Honnegers' Hatchery, Forrest, Ill., with 3,878 eggs and 4,188 points.

Best individual hen in the Pennsylvania test was a White Leghorn entered by J. A. Hanson and Son, Corvallis, Oregon, with 336 eggs and 365.7 points. The second best hen was a Greider bird with 337 eggs and 360 points.

Other Pennsylvania test pens finishing among the first twenty were entries of George H. Anthony, Strausstown, Berks County, 9th and 11th; Guy A. Leader and Sons, York, 10th and 12th a second Greider pen 13th and Leo J. Graybill, McAlisterville, Juniata County, 15th and 18th and Truway Farms, East Berlin, 20th. All were White Leghorns.

Highest Pennsylvania hens, in addition to the second place

taken by Greider, included Guy A. Leader and Sons, 5th, 6th and 11th; Graybill, 13th; Greider, 16th, 17th and 20th; Anthony, 18th.

Top hens and pens in the Pennsylvania test are at Syracuse, N. Y., now for judging in the American Hen of the Year and the American Pen of the Year contests at the annual exposition of the Northeastern Poultry Producers Council (NEPPCO).

The 26th year of the Pennsylvania test opened Oct 1 with 63 pens entered from 12 states.
