Flaming Foliage Tour Guide Issued By State Department

HARRISBURG — If you're contemplating a motor trip to catch nature's autumn display, the state of Pennsylvania has a handy guide for you.

The Pennsylvania Department of Commerce is offering on request free foliage trail guide. A simplified state road map and insets of the nine most popular autumn leaf areas allows for tours of any length. Assistance in planning tours can also be obtained from any of the 20 district forester offices in the state.

The second week in October is expected to be the height of the season, although leaves have already begun to change color. Renovo, Clarion and Somerset will all have foliage festivals during the month of October. Renovo will hold its festivities Oct. 13 and 14, while Clarion will have its parades and fetes from Oct. 19 through Oct. 21.

An unusually even summer temperature and humidity is expected to make Pennsylvania forests more brilliant than ever. Fifty-two per cent of Pennsylvania is forest land, despite the state's reputation as an industrial heartland.
