There they saw barn feeding of 150 prime cattle representing several breeds Calves were purchased from Nebraska and South Dakota at 400 to 450 pounds, and with stilbestrol-fortified feeds are gaining a pound or more daily.

Accompanying the group were M. M. Smith, Lancaster County agricultural agent, Dwight Younkin and Thomas W. King, livestock extension specialists from the Pennsylvania State Universitv. Mr King told the group, "It will be a long time before

Pennsylvania can supply its own demand for feeder steers."

Enthusiasm that marked the tour led by Mr. Smith to remark, "I hope this can be the start of several tours to see others' operations that we can apply to our own farms."


