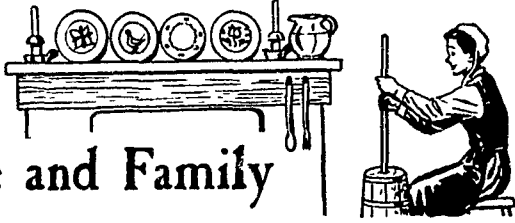


## For the Farm Wife and Family

One cup sweet milk  
One teaspoon vanilla  
One teaspoon baking powder  
One cup crushed nuts  
Three cups flour

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### COCONUT PIE

One cup sugar  
One-half cup flour  
Four egg yolks  
Three and one-half cups milk  
Butter size of a walnut  
One cup coconut

Mix sugar, flour, butter, and egg yolks. Then add the milk gradually and last the egg whites (beaten stiff) and coconut. Put in unbaked pie shell. I always put pies in stove first and then light oven. This helps to prevent flour from setting in the bottom.

Mrs. Grube's household hint: use salad dressing or mayonnaise on plant leaves such as ivy and philodendron.

### Try Gourmet Touch On Fish, Shellfish

Fish and shellfish lend themselves to a variety of special touches designed to bring out their original flavor and make menu-planning and eating fun.

Before broiling or baking fish steaks or fillets, pour melted garlic butter over them, suggests Louise Hamilton, extension nutrition specialist of the Pennsylvania State University. Or top plain cooked fish with slivered blanched almonds browned in melted butter.

Cooked, canned, or frozen shrimp combined with green peas in a medium cream sauce is delicious poured over hot cooked rice. Or wrap scallops or shrimp in half slices of bacon and broil or bake until bacon is crisp.

Q My back porch is jointly connected to both my neighbor's house and my own. We need a new porch. My neighbor claims that he does not use the porch and refuses to pay half of the expense of putting up a new one. I would like to know if I could make him pay his share and how to go about this. S G

A If you and your neighbor own the whole porch jointly, you are entitled to reimbursement

from your neighbor for his proportionate share of any improvements or repairs to the property made with his consent, or to any repairs made without his consent but after notice to him that they are absolutely necessary to the preservation and enjoyment of the property.

If the porch is not jointly owned but each owns his half, you cannot force your neighbor to pay for repairing his half of the porch unless he consents to the repairs.

Q A salesman recently came to our house selling books. He had only one sample volume of the set, but managed to talk my wife into signing one of those unconditional contracts, not subject to cancellation. When we received the set of books we found them not to be as the salesman described and we were very dissatisfied with them. We sent them back to the company but now they are pressing us for payment, regardless of whether or not we accepted the books. What can be done? We feel we have been "took."

A. If the written agreement does not describe the books you intended to purchase, you probably have a good defense to the claim for payment. However, if the agreement describes the books, then you cannot modify the written agreement by any oral agreement that preceded it. If there is no description in the written agreement, the sale may violate the "sale by sample" provision of the Uniform Commercial Code, thus rendering your contract voidable. Your attorney should be consulted.
