Pennsylvania Farmers Association Debates Truck Fee Reductions

Whether to ask the 1957 General Assembly for a reduction in the license fee for farm trucks is a question that will be debated Nov. 20 at the annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association. Proposals have been made by a number of County Farmers Associations which would reduce the farm truck license fees from 50 to 75 per cent. A farm truck is defined as one that is used solely by a farmer to haul his own produce.

Voting delegates from 30 organized counties will adopt a policy on the question Nov 20 at the Holiday Motor Hotel near Harrisburg.

Another question up for consideration is whether Pennsylvania should enact a compulsory insurance law. More than half of the county Farmers Association which have reported on this question have expressed approval of legislation which would provide for compulsory insurance on automobiles. It is expected that more than 300 farmers will attend the two-day session, which marks the sixth anniversary of the Farmers Association, which is affiliated with the American Farm Bureau.

Charles Shuman, President of the American Farm Bureau will address the annual banquet on Monday evening, Nov 19. Dr. Kenneth Hood, formerly with Penn State University, and now with the American Farm Bureau,

will address the noon luncheon on Tuesday, Nov 20.

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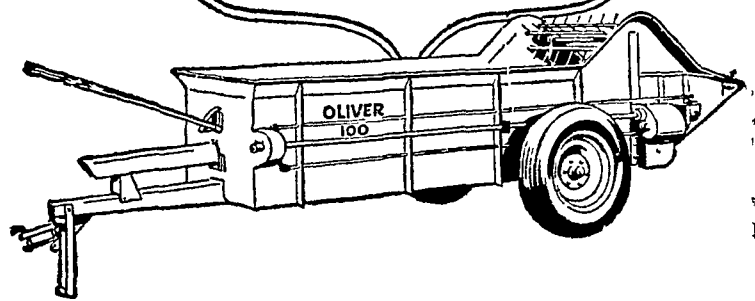
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
