SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. — (Special) — Hereford carlot and pen exhibitors climaxed an outstanding breeding show at the 1956 Grand National Livestock Exposition capturing grand championship honors over all breeds in the feeder calf and fat steer competition.

California State Polytechnic College, San Luis Obispo, Calif., carried the Hereford banner to grand championship in the fat carload show, with Shafter High School, Shafter, Calif., showing their load of Herefords to the reserve grand championship.

In the carloads of feeder cattle, Mee Ranches, Lonoak, Calif., took the grand championship, with Norrell Herefords, Collbran, Colo., winning the reserve championship.

In the Pen of 5 feeder cattle competition, Paicines Ranch, Paicines, Calif., won the grand championship over all breeds on their Herefords.

In the breeding show, Stockton Ranch, Morgan Hill, Calif., won both the champion bull and fe-

Hi-Point Herefords Win Eastern National Division of 171 Head

More than 500 spectators crowded the judging arena at the Eastern National Livestock Exposition to watch 24 exhibitors from 14 states parade 171 head of purebred Herefords before judge Herbert Chandler of Baker, Ore.

Class winners were selected from herds representing eight states, with the champion bull honors going to Hi-Point Farms, Brighton, Mich., on their junior yearling, M & M Zato Dominic. The reserve champion bull was a two-year-old, Larry G Domino 51, shown by Caw Caw Plantation of Orangeburg, S. C. There were 82 bulls shown.

In the female division, A H Karpe, Bakersfield, Calif., showed his junior yearling, Karpe's Duchess 286 to the championship. The reserve championship was won by Portage Farms, Woodville, Ohio, on their senior yearling, Portage Mixette 51.

USDA Buys 2,082,000 Pounds of Turkey in Week to November 19

WASHINGTON — (USDA) — Frozen turkey purchases amounting to 2,082,000 lbs were made this week by the U S Department of Agriculture under the special buying program to help producer prices during the heavy marketing season for this year's record turkey crop. Purchases since first buying in late September now total 26,754,000 lbs.

Price ranges per pound for this week's purchases (week beginning Nov 12) by geographical regions and number of carlots (average of 300,000 lbs) for each region follow: Southeast 39 49 to 39 50 cents for 10 carlots; Midwest 38 44 to 38 50 cents for 26 carlots; Southwest 38 48 to 38 50 cents for 15 carlots; and Western 37 3125 to 37 48 cents for 20 carlots. All prices are on a per lb f o b basis and the overall range was from 37 3125 to 39 50 cents per lb. In making awards consideration was given to area price variations in relation to transportation costs for distribution. In total, bids were received from 17 bidders who offered a total of 2,448,000 lbs.
