

Turner Ranch Hereford Half Interest \$15,000

Sulphur, Okla. — (Special) — Purebred Hereford breeders from 15 states invested a total of \$166,535 in 51 head of Herefords offered in the TR Zato Heir Production Sale at Turner Ranch Dec. 13.

A total of 31 bulls brought \$131,935, an average of \$4,256. The 20 females led into the auction ring brought a total of \$29,600, an average of \$1,480. The over-all average for the sale was \$3,167.

Half interest in TR Husker Rupert 34, champion Hereford at the American Royal in Kansas City and the Blue Grass Hereford Show at Lexington, Ky., topped the sale on a corporation bid of \$15,000. Bids were submitted in behalf of the cor-

In the female offering, top animal was TR Zato Heiress 640, a full sister to the top selling heifer in the 1955 Turner sale, which brought \$3,000 on a bid by Flying L Ranch of Davis, Okla.

Turner Ranch, consistently high on the list of top sales, is owned by Roy Turner former Governor of Oklahoma and managed by Jim McClelland.

March Selected Egg Month, Shift From January

National Egg Month will be held in March instead of January in 1957 and will launch a long-range "Eat Extra Eggs" program for the egg industry, the Poultry and Egg National Board points out in an announcement of plans for making March the greatest egg month of all.

The March campaign will combine spectacular egg promotion effort, nationally and locally, with all-out activity at the "grassroots" in the 48 states to finance intensified egg promotion programs by PENB 'round the calendar.

The financing effort is being built around a voluntary check-off system for egg producers. The check-off will be 10 cents for each case of eggs sold during March.

State Poultry and Egg Board committees will spearhead campaigns encouraging consumers to eat extra eggs and urging producers to participate in the eggs check-off as a practical means of helping themselves and the industry from which they earn their living.

Materials of help in conducting the egg check-off campaign have been developed by the Poultry & Egg National Board and distributed to all state PENB committees.
