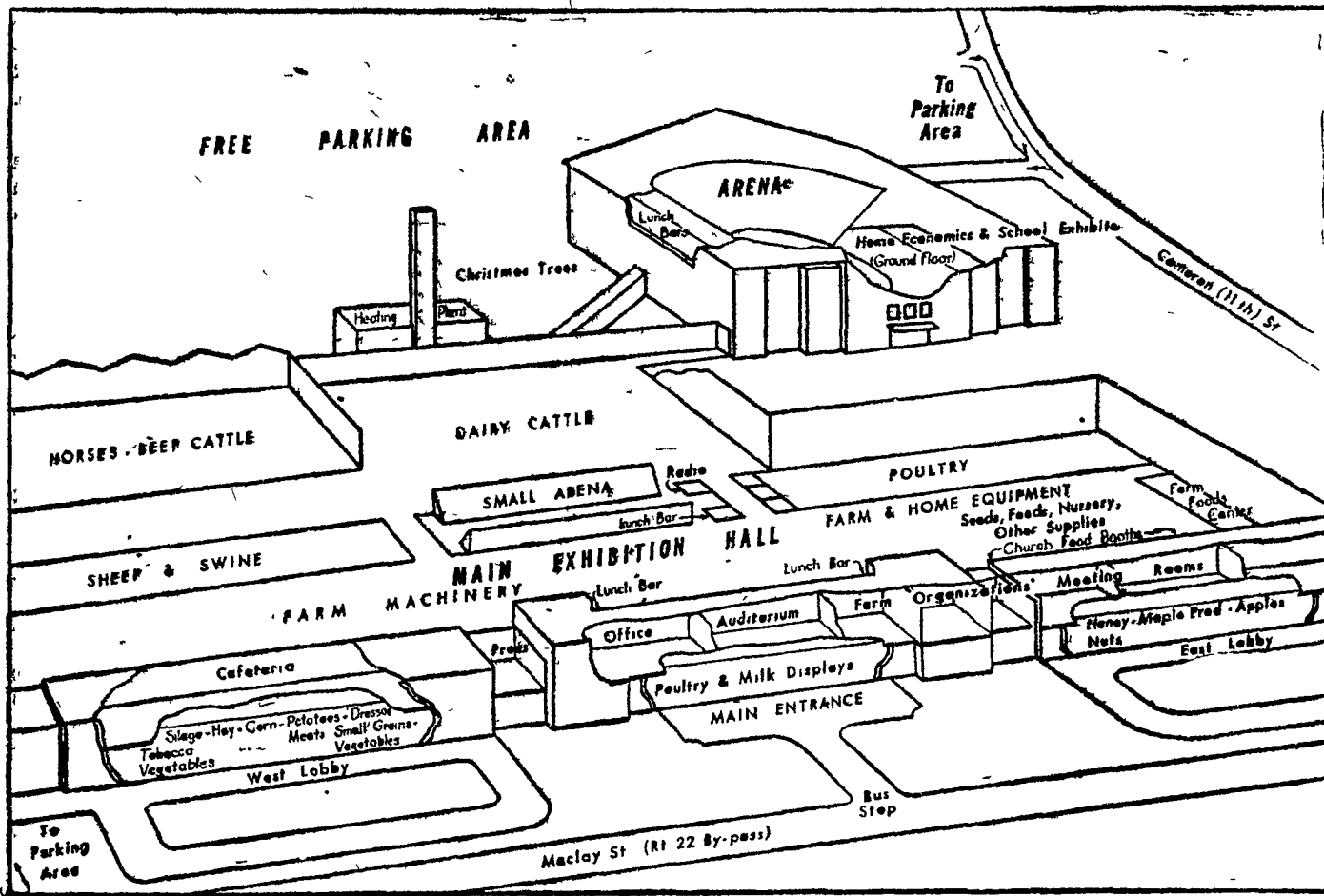


Inside Look — 1957 Pennsylvania Farm Show

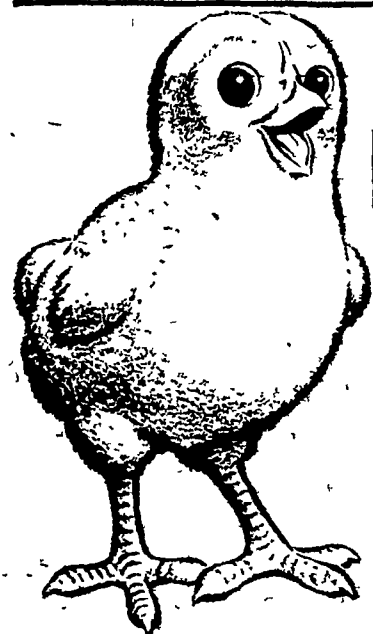
