Too Much Treatment for Coccidiosis Can Be Dangerous.

We find many poultrymen overtreating for coccidiosis. Many are feeding a mash containing a coccidiosis preventive from day-old until maturity. When the birds reach maturity and have to be taken off the coccidiosis medicine they sometimes come down with a bad dose of coccidiosis. They evidently haven't developed and resistance to the disease. The birds become thin. They do not lay well and some birds may die.

We at Babcock Poultry Farm suggest that you think twice before using a coccidiosis preventive for birds to be used for layers. (Perhaps it's O. K. for birds being raised for broilers.)

We prevent coccidiosis by good management. For you, if coccidiosis strikes it might be well to treat with a sulfa drug for several days as recommended by the manufacturer and then discontinue the treatment. On this basis your birds will probably develop a natural immunity to coccidiosis and will probably be much better layers for you. If at all possible, use sanitation and good rearing and lots of room to prevent coccidiosis. Also the earlier you get your pullets to roosting the less likely they are to have trouble with this disease.

How to rear your chicks is fully described in Babcock's 1957 literature. It tells all about how Babcock Bessies are bred to give you the greatest profits.
