

Broiler Price Drops Nearly 1 Cent At Lancaster Exchange Thursday

LANCASTER, Feb. 7 — (Lancaster Poultry Exchange, sales report 200) — Broiler prices dropped .95 cents from the auction average one week ago. One year ago there were 49 lots offered totaling 174,450 birds. A total of 133,950 birds or 41 lots were sold at both the Tuesday and Thursday sales. 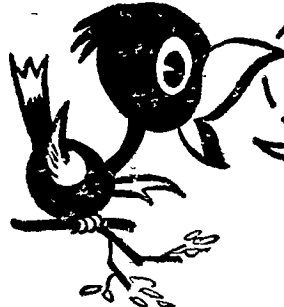

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13 — (USDA) — Weak. Prices were unchanged to ½ cent lower on top quality large and ½-1 cent lower on large extras. Increased supplies of all grades were more than sufficient for the lighter demand. Out-of-storage, movement was moderate in volume.

Wholesale selling prices: minimum 10 per cent AA quality. Large 45-48 lb. white 36-37, brown 36-36½, medium white 34-35, brown 34-35. Extras, minimum 60 per cent A quality. Large 45-50 lb. white 33-34, mixed 33-33½, medium white 32-32½, mixed 31½-32. Standards 31-32, checks 27-29.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13 — (USDA) — Processed poultry, ready-to-cook (ice packed), young chickens, unsettled. More than adequate supplies were available to meet the fair demand.
