Three lots of Leghorn Fowl, 1,120 in all, sold for 13 and 131/2 cents. A lot of 32 week old capons sold for 4¼ cents.

During the past month 439,105 birds were sold through the Lancaster Exchange in 122 lots. The average price for all birds for the month was 20.9 cents with the range being from 22.2 cents to 19.7 cents.

Lancaster — CATTLE: 3,100, week ago 3,150. Slaughter steers and heifers made up beween 40-45 per cent of the receipts with steers predominating. Stockers and feeders comprising about 40 per cent, cows 10 per cent.

Quality of slaughter steers largely good and choice although few loads high choice and prime also on sale. Compared with last Wednesday slaughter steers and heifers strong to 50 cents higher. Cows 25-50 cents higher, bulls fully steady, stockers and feeders strong to 25 cents higher.
