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Live Stock and Meat Board Emphasis On Meat Research and Education

Editors note: This is the second in a series of articles on the operations of promotional organizations supported by agricultural industries and producers.

Back in 1923 meat was being attacked as detrimental to health. Little or no information was available concerning the merits of meat as a food.

As a result, the National Live Stock and Meat Board was formed by livestock growers, feeders, marketing agencies, meat packers and retailers to carry on a program of research and education on meat.

A board of directors controls the organization. At present 16 of the 30 members represent growers and feeders, five represent markéting agencies, four represent packers, and five represent retailers and restaurants.

The organization is financed by deductions from livestock growers and feeders on livestock marketed. These deductions are on a per head basis, as follows: cattle, two cents a head; hogs, and

calves, 3/3 cent a head; sheep and lambs 2/5 cents a head. Packers who slaughter the livestock make an equal contribution.
