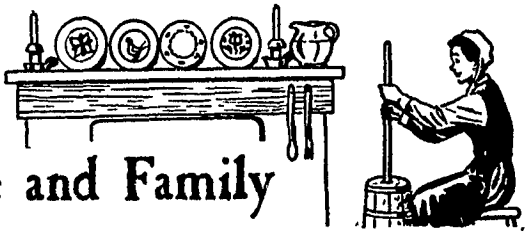

hours, or until tender. The last half hour add onions and celery. If cooked in a pressure sauce pan, cook 25 to 30 minutes.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Biscuits are easier to cut, and there will be less waste if the dough is sliced into squares with a sharp knife — instead of cutting with a round cutter.

Plastic grocery bags make good containers for storing purses and gloves.

Bits of crisply fried bacon add interest and flavor to spinach or other greens, and to scrambled eggs.

Painted handles on knives and other kitchen implements should never be allowed to stand in water. The wood under the enamel will absorb water and cause the paint to chip off.

To stop a cake from sticking to the baking pan, grease the pan, then place a sheet of waxed paper on the bottom of the pan, and grease the waxed paper.

To keep cream filling from soaking into a layer cake, sprinkle a small quantity of confectioner's sugar over the cake before covering it with the filling.

A little dry mustard or salt rubbed on the hands and then rinsed off will remove onion odors.

When ironing bias-cut pieces, always iron with the grain of the material. This will keep the fabric from stretching out of shape.

A good way to remove a grease spot from non-washable wallpaper is to place a blotter over the spot and supply a warm iron.

Paint low overhangs and projecting pipes in your basement an eye-catching color. For safe cellar stairs, paint the top and bottom steps white.

Use terry cloth to dry dishes and glassware. The towels will leave dishes gleaming bright and lint free.

When painting a room plan to paint the ceiling, then the wall, and finally the woodwork. For larger surfaces use a paint roller or a four-inch brush. For the woodwork and small areas, a two-inch brush is best.

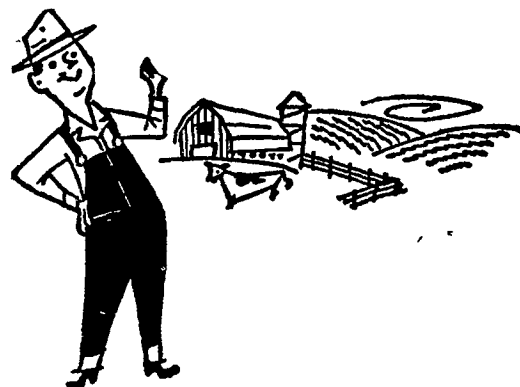
