The Paradise Community 4 H Club met at the home of Melvin R Stoltzfus, R1 Ronks with 16 members and three leaders present


At the meeting a wide variety of projects were selected Among them are flowers, vegetables, sweet corn, strawberries, swine, entomology, bees and capons.


